Merit Review (Cth)

Step 1:

What statutory power was used to make decision? Is merit review (AAT) available under relevant statute?

- → AAT power to review must provide in the statute Administrative Appeals Tribunal Act 1975 (Cth) s 25
- → Decision in fact made, regardless of whether it is legally made (Collector of Customs (NSW) v Brian Lawlor Automotive Pty Ltd)

Step 2:

Standing

- ✓ Person whose interests are affected by the decision (AAT Acts s 27(1))
- ✓ Organisation (AAT Acts s 27(2))
 - × BUT not organisation form after the decision made (AAT Acts s 27(3))

Limits imposed by statute

- → Pre-condition (ie. seek internal review)
- → Time limit
 - ✓ Within 28 days of a decision made (AAT Acts s 29(2)), subject to discretionary extension (AAT Acts s 29(4))
- → Varying the normal procedure
- → Varying the normal power of the body (alter the orders it can make)

Right to reason

- → May request for a statement of reasons (AAT Acts s 28) UNLESS
 - × AG issue a public interest certificate where disclosure would prejudice international relations, national security (AAT Acts s 28(2))
- → Reason for decisions must be in writing (AAT Acts s 43(2))

Process

- → Make a correct or preferable decision before the Tribunal
 - ✓ Policy is a relevant factor to consider (Drake v Minister for Immigration)
 - Cannot be subjective must not involve personal standards or philosophy
 (Re: Visa Cancellation Applicant and Minister for immigration)
 - × Should not be influenced by community standards or community values
- → May bring fresh evidence (Shi v Migration Agents Registration Authority)
- → Determined on the changed fact (Fairlight Instruments Pty Ltd)
- → No hearing rules, little formality, faster and cheaper (AAT Acts s 33)

Step 3:

Draw the facts in questions to make arguments.

Step 4:

Remedy

Make a decision in writing (AAT Acts s 43(1))

Question 1: Merit Review (CTH)

P will be seeking review of decision made by (<u>Minister/officer</u>) to (<u>issue s 7 /refuse to issue s 11 /cancel s 22</u>) P's Australian travel document under (<u>section</u>) of the Australian Passport Act ('APA'). s 50 of APA allows for Merit Review with the AAT as provided in the Act. This is a preferable option because it's faster and cheaper.
