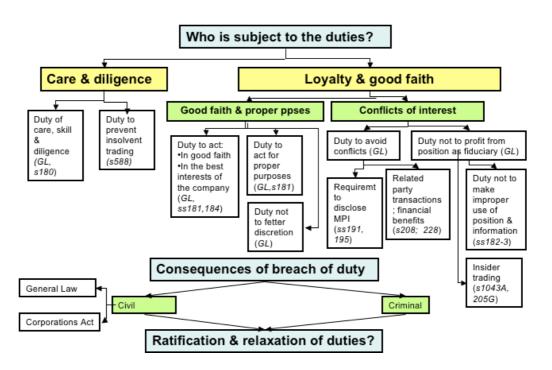
11. ANSWER STRUCTURES

Have any of the Ds breached their DUTIES?

Stat. duties supplement GenLaw duties: s128



STEP 1: Do the duties APPLY to [X]?

• Director (s9): 180 – 181 – 182 – 183 – 191 or GenLaw Duties

Officer (s9): 180 – 181 – 182 – 183

Employee: 182 – 183

Ltd Co: 208

3rd P: involved (s79) – 182 – 183 or GenLaw: Barnes v Addy

STEP 2: WHO are the duties OWED to/WHO can ENFORCE them?

- General rule: Co not Ms: Charlton v Baber
 - Exception: Particular duty to particular SH not competing w' other duties: Charlton v Baber [allowed derivative action in part]
- ASIC can bring action in name of Co (ASIC Act 2001 s50) if in pub interest:
 Brighton Hall Securities

STEP 3: Consider the CONDUCT in question

- For each questionable conduct list the duties potentially breached
- Identify potential consequences → choose CA/GenLaw + which duties
- Does the BUSINESS JUDGMENT RULE apply? (180 + 181: Rich)

STEP 4: If duty applies to [X], what are the duty's ELEMENTS?

• State the duty [See tables below]

STEP 5: Has [X] MET the required STANDARD?

- Are they an executive D (CFO, CEO) or have expert knowledge (ie. accountant, lawyer)?
- (180) Assess at time of breach NOT w' the benefit of hindsight: ASIC v Rich

STEP 6: Is there a RELATED PARTY? [Ltd Co only]

STEP 7: If [X] is in BREACH, has there been RATIFICATION or RELIEF?

- Ratification: Is the duty able to be ratified? → Has the ratification process been complied with?
- Relief: Is it a CPP? (1317S) or other 1318
